

• The largest district should be no more than ~110 people greater than the smallest district.


ABOUT THEBLOCKS

What is Districting

Definition

<u>Districting</u> is the initial process of creating election district boundaries.

These boundaries determine:

- Eligibility to run for office must live within boundaries to qualify for election.
- Who votes in the election only voters within the district vote for their District board member.



Required Redistricting Criteria

Ranked criteria that must be followed in city redistricting

There are a number of criteria that are required under the FAIR MAPS Act (ranked):

- Relatively equal size people, not citizens
- Contiguous districts should not hop/jump
- Maintain "communities of interest"
- Easily identifiable and understandable lines, following city, natural, and man-made boundaries
- Keep districts compact appearance/function



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Contiguity

Two definitions for what is contiguous

Contiguity should be thought of as "literal" and "functional."


- An area that is one whole piece is "literally contiguous."
- An area that represents how the population functions or how people are connected is "functionally contiguous."


Determining what is "contiguous"





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Compactness

Determining what is "compact"

The measure of compactness can get complicated.


- Ratio of the circumference of a district and the area of a district.
- Measuring the number of distinct straight lines and the number of kinks and bends.
- Simply outlawing funny shapes.








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Bringing like people together for representation

What are you looking for in trying to judge the applicability of a Community of Interest to the districting process?

- Group with shared culture / characteristics
- Geographic Nature / Density / Ability to be mapped
- Relationship to Agency / Policies

Bringing like people together for representation

<u>Communities of interest</u> are the building blocks of districts. A community of interest includes ethnic and language minorities and other groups.

- Subjective
- Open-ended to be as inclusive as possible

Communities covered by the Voting Rights Act

- Latinos
- Asians
- African Americans

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While communities of interest may include race, it cannot be the *predominant factor* in drawing district boundaries.

Bringing like people together for representation

- Historical communities
- Economic interests
- Racial composition
- Ethnic Areas
- Cultural amenities
- Religious facilities
- Immigrant communities
- Languages spoken
- Geographic features
- Neighborhoods
- Economic opportunity zones

- Tourism Areas
- School districts
- Outdoor recreation areas
- Communities defined by natural resource features
- Downtown / Urban
- Rural or Agricultural
- Homeowner or Renters
- Creative arts communities
- Media markets
- Many, many more

What is NOT a Community of Interest

Preventing a Districting from Becoming a Gerrymander

The Fair Maps Act explicitly prohibits these groups from being considered as communities of interest

- Political party affiliation
- Incumbents
- Political candidates

It also is hard, in redistricting to truly consider:

- Groups of similarly minded people who do not share a similar geographic location.
- *Communities of Interest that are districtwide.*



Three Critical Questions in Defining YOUR Community

- Does the community have a shared culture, characteristics or bond?
- Is the community geographic in nature? Is the community able to be mapped?
- How would you describe the community's relationship with the jurisdiction, and how is your community affected by the policy decisions made by the elected officials?




Image: Second systemClay Elementary SchoolImage: Second systemDistrictImage: Second systemFinal Plan






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

Last New Year Eve's unprecedented rain events and inflow into the sewer system resulted in the rupture of the Sewer Authority Mid-Coastside (SAM) owned Intertie Pipeline (IPS). SAM was sued over a prior failure of the pipe in 2017 and is required by Consent Decree to replace the pipe by 2024.

Subsequently SAM, with input from its Finance Committee and member agency managers, developed a 2023/2024 budget that contains funds towards the pipe replacement. However, at the SAM April 24 and May 8 meetings the SAM Board was unable to approve the SAM General Budget for Fiscal Year 2023/2024.

The City of Half Moon Bay has stated at the SAM meetings and in a letter from the City Manager that it will only approve the SAM general budget "on the condition that the Montara Force Main Project is removed.

This action puts SAM at risk of having to operate without an approved budget, and further puts its agents at risk of violating a federal consent decree.

RECOMMENDATION:

This item was placed on the agenda to allow the MWSD board to discuss the possible SAM budget failure and take appropriate action.
